Bob Spicer again treated the group to pizza, thanks Bob! The meeting was held at the South Metro Fire Rescue building in Centennial, Colorado.

President Jazun welcomed the group including new members Doug Moh and Lucin Kasperek. Lucin is a private pilot and has helped build an RV-12. Doug is building a Sling High Wing taildragger.

Minutes from the February chapter meeting were approved without modification.

Old Business:

President Jazun recognized several chapter members in attendance for their continuing support of the chapter.

Hannah Stauffer creates the monthly chapter newsletter, Scott Wilson is the chapter webmaster, and Jim Elliott, a former chapter president and tech councilor were recognized for their longtime efforts in support of Chapter 301. Thank you!!

I'm a fellow EAA member, although not a member of any local chapters. I'm importing a warbird replica project from the UK and I have room in the container for another small project that's near mine and figured I'd check around and see if anyone in the Denver area would be interested.

The project is a Taylor Titch finished and flown about 4 years ago for a total of about 15 hours. It was all signed off and approved by the UK-LAA. It originally had an 0-200 in it, but the engine, prop and some instruments were removed for another project. The original builder wanted to put another 0-200 or C90 in it, but unfortunately passed away before he had the chance.

It's been flown and registered so I know there will be some complications with getting it re-registered here with the FAA. Theoretically the import itself should be simple since I believe it'll be covered under the 8022.20 tariff schedule code and be free of any duties.

The gentleman selling it is the same as I'm buying my project from and I'll be flying over there to inspect mine before finalizing the purchase and loading it in the container. I can do some basic inspections of the other project for anyone interested and load it in with mine if they choose to bring it over. Project price is about \$4400 depending on exchange rate at the time and freighting cost would be about \$1500.

I'd very much appreciate forwarding the details to any local chapter members who may be interested.

Hanging the engine on an RV-10 is a family affair!
